# Teaching youth how to become productive and positive leaders and citizens

The Moosomin 802 Royal Canadian Air Cadet Pipe stone Squadron is a youth program that has operated in the Mossomin area since forming in 1971. The cadet pro-gram is open to all youth in the area between the ages of 12 years to 18 years of age, with no fees. New cadets are welcome at any time of the year and there is no set registration deadline.

The cadet program is a collaboration between the Air Cadet League of Canada and Department of National Defense, with the main goals of the program focusing on the

promotion of positive citizenship, leadership and foster-ing an interest in the military. Cadets meet Mondays throughout the school year at the Moosomin Convention Centre. During the weekly sessions, cadets will learn about the fundamentals of flight, survival skills, how to maintain care of their uniforms, marksmanship, and learn about the Canadian Armed Forces and the roles they play internationally, just to mention a brief few of the topics covered. During the training year the cadets will also get to experience survival campouts, gliding, and participation in Remembrance Day ceremonies, drill, marksmanship and effective speaking competitions, as well as visiting various military institu-

With all the activities that the squadron performs throughout the year, the biggest draw to the program continues to be the ability for cadets to earn either their gliders pilot license or their power aircraft license at no cost to the cadet. Over the course of the last 12 years, 802

Pipestone Air Cadets have graduated seven pilots.

Cadets through hard work have the ability to earn their glider's license at 15 years of age and 16 years of age for their private pilot's license. If cadets choose not to pursue their pilots license, the cadet program has many

more summer courses that can be taken such as survival instructor, advanced aviation, leadership and ceremonial instructor, physical fitness instructors, basic survival, and general training.

"This is a fantastic program that not only offers the cadets opportunities to connect with other youth from across Canada through free summer camps," says Commanding Officer Ethan Courteau. "This program also provides opportunity for youth to develop leadership skills, practice effective speaking skills, participate in survival kills, and so much poper." vival skills, and so much more.

# Get Involved with Saskatchewan Gateway Parish

Saskatchewan Gateway Parish is a group of Anglican congregations serving the communities between Moosomin and Rocanville. These churches may be small in number, but are rich in history, deeply committed to their faith, and actively engaged in building strong and connected communities.

Each congregation within the parish has stood for over a century. St. Alban's Church in Moosomin, built in 1885, remains an important part of the town's historical life. In 2023, it opened its doors to the Moosomin Visual Arts Centre, bringing vibrant creativity into the building.

South of Moosomin, St. Peter's Spring Creek is a small country church and one of the oldest Anglican churches in southern Saskatchewan. Built when the area was first settled, it still holds services each summer. This year, the church received a new sign, replacing a hand-painted one that stood for over 100 years. The community gathered for a special dedication service, celebrating the care and love that local families continue to give this beautiful site.

In Rocanville, St. Thomas Church has been active since 1911. Though the building is small and has no running water, it remains full of life. The church is home to a growing Sunday school and one of the last working church bells in the area. The children look forward to ringing it each Sunday morning.

#### **Worship and Services**

Sunday worship takes place at both St. Alban's in Moosomin and St. Thomas in Rocanville, with services starting at 11 a.m. St. Thomas offers a volunteer-led Sunday school and also provides access to Confirmation classes. Once a month, both churches host reserve sacrament services. This means communion, and is administered by the Deacon in Charge.

The parish has celebrated several baptisms and is always happy to welcome more. These moments bring joy and renewal to the life of the church.

## **New Local Leadership**

This November will mark an exciting milestone. On November 1, 2025, the parish's Deacon in Charge, Jessie Leigh Johnston, will be ordained into the priesthood. After five years of study and local training, she has completed the WECAN/QSMM program and received her Licentiate in Theology through Emmanuel and St. Chad in Saskatoon, in partnership with the Diocese of Qu'Appelle.

Unlike the traditional path through seminary, this journey has been rooted in the local community. The support of Sask Gateway Parish has allowed her to remain on her family farm while preparing for ordination. Once ordained, she will be able to offer full priestly services, including weddings, communion, and other sacraments.

Jessie Leigh says this transition brings great hope for the future. "Being a locally raised priest means I understand the rural lifestyle, and I'm not going anywhere. This opens up opportunities for us to strengthen what we have and grow in ways that make sense for our community," she says.

## Caring for the Community

The parish's work extends far beyond Sunday mornings. It provides home visits and pastoral care to anyone in need. Through the Moosomin & District Association of Churches, the parish helps offer devotional time and regular church services at the Southeast Integrated Care Home in Moosomin.

Weekly services are also held every Thursday at 2 p.m. at Cobblestone Apartments, creating a meaningful connection with residents there. Plans are underway to begin Bible study groups in both Moosomin and Rocanville. Confirmation classes can also be arranged for those interested.

#### **Supporting Youth**

In collaboration with the Moosomin & District Association of Churches, the Diocese of Qu'Appelle, and St. Thomas, the parish launched an after-school youth program in Rocanville. Called Friday Night Live, the program takes place at the St. Thomas Parish Hall and is open to all children from Kindergarten to Grade 6, regardless of religious background.

The program is completely free and provides a safe, welcoming place for children to learn, play, and build friendships. It runs entirely on volunteer support and donations. Anyone interested in getting involved can visit their Facebook page by searching FNL - Friday Night Live.

## **Fundraisers and Community Support**

Sask Gateway Parish hosts two major fundraisers each year. The B.C. Peach Sale brings in support while also delivering delicious fruit to the community. This past summer marked the fundraiser's seventh year.

During the Christmas season, the parish brings back a cherished tradition, the Kelly Family Christmas. Originally started by Delta Kelly, this event is a celebration of hospitality faith and profit tools but the descriptors to being repealed to earther.

tality, faith, and gratitude that continues to bring people together. "What I've seen here is a deep commitment to faith and to each other," says the Deacon Jessie Leigh. "There is so much compassion, joy, and perseverance within our congregations. It's an honour to be part of it."



As the parish looks ahead, there is strong hope for renewal and growth. New ideas, fresh energy, and continued community support are paving the way for a future where tradition and innovation walk hand in hand.

# Moosomin Shrine Club

Shriners Hospitals for Children, commonly known as Shriners Children's, is a network of non-profit children's hospitals and other pediatric medical facilities across North America. Children with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate are eligible for care and receive all services in a family-centered environment, regardless of the patients' ability to pay. Care for children is usually provided until age 18, although in some cases, it may be extended to age 21.



Headquartered in Tampa, Florida, the hospitals are owned and operated by Shriners International, a Freemasonry-related organization. Patients are not required to have any familial affiliation with the Shriners order nor Freemasonry. The hospitals advertising campaign features the tagline, "Love to the Rescue."





## **TREATMENTS**

Treatment areas cover a wide range of pediatric orthopaedics, including scoliosis, limb discrepancies, clubfoot, hip dyspla-

sia, and juvenile idiopathic arthritis, as well as cerebral palsy, spina bifida (myelomeningocele), and other neurological conditions that affect ambulation and movement. Three of the hosnitals provide spinal cord injury rehabilitation that is developmentally appropriate for children and adolescents, with adventure and adapted sports programs, activity-based rehabilitation, aquatherapy, animal-assisted therapy, and other programs. Four of the hospitals (Boston, Galveston, Cincinnati, and Sacramento) provide care for children with burns, as well as treating a variety of skin conditions such as epidermolysis bullosa and toxic epidermal necrolysis. The Boston. Chicago, Shreveport, Galveston, Springfield, and Portland hospitals also provide treatment for children with craniofacial conditions, especially facial clefts.

The hospital in Sacramento is the only hospital in the Shriners' system that focuses on all three areas of treatment (hurns, orthopaedics, and spinal cord injuries), as well as research. The Sacramento hospital also houses its own orthotics and prosthetics lab and development facilities. Transportation to the hospitals is often provided free of charge for patients and their family by Shriner-drivers (also known as Hospital Tripsters) across the country, by van or by airplane. Children accepted for treatment become part of the Shriners Hospital system until their 18th or, sometimes, their 21st, birthday, eligible for both inpatient and outpatient treatment for all facets of their disability.



## RESEARCH AND EDUCATION

While the main emphasis of the hospitals is to provide medical care to children regardless of the family's ability to pay, the mission of the hospitals also includes research on the conditions treated and the education of medical professionals, includina medical residents and fellows, nurses, physical, recreation, and occupational therapists, speech and language pathology, psychologists, social workers, and

child life specialists.



## Helping people settle successfully in Southeast Saskatchewan

The East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. (ECNWCI) is a non-profit agency which provides information and services to normation and services to newcomers, immigrants and refugees in the East Central Saskatchewan re-gion leading towards their successful settlement and integration in the community. The agency has a service area of 150 km radius around Yorkton. The ECNWCI is a first

stop collaborative centre to welcome newcomers to the East Central Saskatchewan region. Newcomers estab-lish their first connections with their new community, through the agency by accessing information about the resources and services available in the community. The agency offers Settlement Services, the Settlement Worker in Schools Program (SWIS), the Community Connec-tions Program and

Employment Services. We have two new programs, the Home Instruc-tion for Parents of Pre-school Youngsters (HIPPY) and the Needs and Assets Assessment and Referrals

Service (NAARS).

The Settlement Worker in Schools Program (SWIS) is a school-based program designed to help newcomer students and their families settle in their school and community. SWIS connects newly arrived families to services and resources in the school and community to pro-mote settlement and foster student achievement. The SWIS program focuses on newcomer families that are in their first few years in Canada. The program also focuses on newcomer students and parents, that have unresolved settle-ment needs.

Some of the services provided by the agency for newcomers to Canada include: community facilities and services tours, identi-fying newcomer's settle-ment needs, connection to cultural, social and recreational groups and events, referrals to community services, connecting with volunteers to support them in their settlement and integration, solution focused counselling, in-formation and orientation seminars and interpretation. The agency also provides connections to housing, education, healthcare, banking, transportation, employment, places of worship and other activi-ties which accelerate the

settlement process.

The East Central Sas-katchewan Immigration Partnership (ECSIP) is an initiative hosted by EC-

NWCI aimed at bringing together service providers, settlement agencies, community groups, mu-nicipal representatives, nicipal employers and other key organizations across the

municipalities in East Central Saskatchewan to create welcoming and inclusive communities for newcomers to Canada.

Getting started is easy. "No one's going to turn you away," Jarrod says. "Come sit in on a rehearsal, ask questions. That's how I started. Now I've been in three


With two productions on the go this season, Moose-berry is busier than usual. Whether you want to act, work backstage, or just see what it's all about, it's a good time to stop by.



Fisheries - S.W.F. branches conduct local fisheries projects (fish stocking, stream enhancement, trout ponds, etc.) throughout the province in conjunction with the provincial governments Fish & Wildlife Development Fund. With assistance from biologists, the branches are the main force behind securing much of Saskatchewan's fisheries habitat.

Habitat Enhancement - Over one million trees have been planted on cuftivated parcels of wildlife land throughout the province to provide food and shelter for wildlife.

Henry Kelsey - An annual listing is kept of all qualifying big game heads, with a Records Book published every few years.
