"I chose it for a couple of reasons, the first one being I

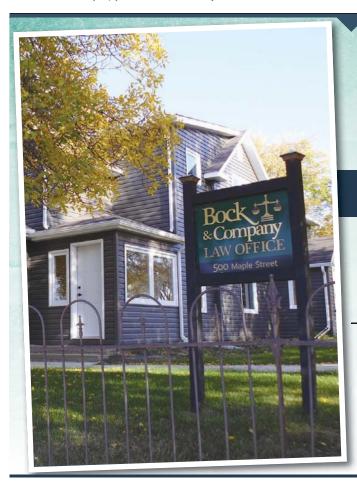

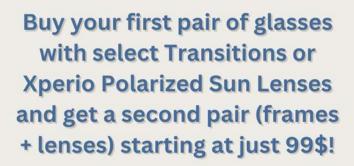

Breeze Business Management & Waystone Software

When J'aime Payne left her hometown of Huntsville, Ontario—better known as Muskoka or Cottage Country—in 2013 to pursue a career in music, she never imagined the journey would one day bring her to the wide-open skies of Moosomin, Sas-

katchewan.

In Toronto, Payne immersed herself in the city's mersed nerseir in the city s creative pulse. She wrote and performed original songs, secured FACTOR jury-approved funding for a full-length album, and received a MuchFACT grant to produce a profes-sional music video. Her songwriting expanded to include commercial work for global brands like Visa. Audible, and Hyundai. As her profile grew, so did her presence behind the scenes—managing grants her presence behind the scenes—managing grants for other artists and eventually serving as Director of Member Services at the Canadian Independent Recording Artists' Association (CIRAA).

It was within Toronto's vibrant arts community that she also met her future spouse. Their connection, rooted in creativity and ambition, would eventually carry them across the country.

ally carry them across the country.

Despite her blossoming career, Payne found herself increasingly disillusioned by the relentless self-promotion demanded by the music industry. Tired of chasing algorithms, she set out on a soul-searching trip to Saba Island in the Dutch Caribbean. There, she reconnected with her she reconnected with her creative instincts—and returned to Canada with the idea for The Snow Lake Initiative, a social enter-prise designed to support Canadian artists through micro-grants and mentor-ship. She launched the pro-gram in 2018. Designed to be simple and accessible, it provided small but mean-ingful financial boosts and connected emerging artists with experienced mentors.



The Snow Lake Initiative quickly earned a reputa-tion for cutting through red tape and lowering barriers—before the pandemic made sponsorship unsustainable, forcing her to make the difficult decision to wind it down. Meanwhile,

Meanwhile, Payne's long-standing interest in business and financial management was gaining momentum. The spark had been lit years earlier, when she met Mark Swann, founder of NorthSoft Systems, at a Muskoka music competition. Recognizing her knack for structure and client care, Swann encouraged her to consider accounting—a career path she soon embraced during a financially difficult sea-Payne's sne soon embraced during a financially difficult sea-son. Returning to Musko-ka, and with the support of her parents, she commit-ted to rebuilding from the

ground up.
In 2020, she founded Breeze Business Management, a virtual bookkeeping firm serving cli-ents across Canada. From trades and retail businesses to creative entrepreneurs, Breeze quickly attracted a loyal clientele drawn to Payne's signature mix of clarity, transparency, and care. As Breeze grew, so

did her interest in developing tools to solve the everyday challenges her clients faced. In 2021, she began co-developing a cloud-based accounting tool in partnership with North-Soft Systems, drawing di-rectly from her hands-on experience working with

small business owners.

In 2022, Payne relocated to Regina to support her spouse through a family medicine residency. There, she joined Cultiva-tor by Conexus, a startup accelerator that provided structure and mentorship for early-stage ventures. She continued working on tech solutions—and rein-troduced music into her life, collaborating with Re-

life, collaborating with Regina-based producer Nasmore on her song Ritual, which has quietly gained over 11,000 streams, particularly in Portugal and the United States.

"I'm still waiting for more streams," she laughs. "My most popular song is still a trap-style children's anthem about Santa. With over 400,000 views on Tree-house Direct's YouTube channel... let's just say I'm not holding my breath."

In July 2024, after her spouse completed residency, the couple chose to settle

in Moosomin-drawn by the town's strong commu-nity values and welcoming medical community.

In early 2025, Payne co-founded Waystone Software with Linda Moore, her longtime manager at Breeze. Together, they're building tailored software solutions designed to ad-dress the real-world chal-lenges their clients face

every day.

But Payne's

doesn't stop at business and technology. She recently launched Muskoka in Moosomin—a curated collection of ar-tisan goods from Ontar-io's cottage country. From handmade treats to season-al favourites, the initiative

al favourites, the initiative offers a cozy, nostalgic taste of Muskoka—right here in southeast Saskatchewan. "I wanted to create something that felt both nostalgic and fresh," Payne says. "Muskoka is where I'm from, but Moosomin is home now. There's something really special about combining the two."

The collection will debut at Trends Mercantile

and will also be featured at the Moosomin Visual Arts Centre's Christmas Market on November 22. Payne serves as Treasurer

at MVAC, where she's also taking part in a light-heart-ed challenge to explore the diverse art styles offered through the centre's robust

programming.
And in true entrepreneurial fashion, she's already working on her next community offering—boutique indoor cycling class-

es.

Currently completing her group cycle instructor certification, Payne hopes to launch a welcoming spin studio experience in Moosomin, offering a low-pressure way to move, sweat and compet

low-pressure way to move, sweat, and connect.
"I've always struggled with balancing a screen-based career and physical wellness," she says. "This is about introducing a style of exercise I love (and wisch) and helping oth. miss), and helping others enjoy something that, frankly, most of us don't look forward to-working

tensity cardio, paired with great music and soft, ambigreat music and soft, ambient lighting to create a more enjoyable atmosphere. Classes will cater to all fitness levels—from those just returning to movement, to those looking to diversify their routine. And yes, there might even be a bingo card challenge involving Iron Prairie, An-ytime Fitness, Exhale Yoga, and her yet-to-be-named studio to encourage a more

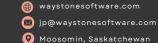

As a licensed audiologist and mother of three, Chelsea was on maternity leave from her position with the Saskatchewan Health Authority, when her husband's new job brought the family to Esterhazy. Chelsea was faced with limited audiology opportunities in rural areas and the demands of raising a young family, so she made the bold decision to start her own With guidance from a business advisor

at WESK, and strong community support, House of Hearing was established. The name came to Chelsea one day by perfect-



ly reflecting her vision of a welcoming, home-like clinic where patients feel understood, respected, and cared for. Today, House of Hearing offers a wide variety of services for individuals aged 4 and up, including:

Chelsea runs the clinic alongside the office manager, Natasha Morrison, the friendly face and voice patients first meet. Together, they form a small, but dedicated team driven by their "People over Profit" philosophy. Every patient is treated like family, and the focus is always on trust, education, and individualized care, never money.

Accessibility is at the core of House of Hearing's mission. In addition to the Esterhazy clinic, Chelsea also travels to Rocanville and Broadview and offers on-site and in-home services for workplaces, care homes, or individuals with mobility chal-lenges. The clinic is also expanding it's mobile and virtual services to reach more rural and remote communities.

Owning her own practice has given Chelsea the freedom to control the quality of care she provides. She has seen the strain rural residents face when traveling long distances for hearing care and she is



passionate about closing that gap across Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

House of Hearing continues to grow, fuelled largely by word-of-mouth referrals. Many patients come in after negative experiences elsewhere, and Chelsea takes pride in helping them rediscover the pos-itive impact hearing health can have on their lives

Chelsea regularly hosts free community events and presentations, both in person and online. Teaching topics like Brain Hearing™ technology, which focuses on how the brain, not just the ears, processes sound.
